2022 RUSU GOVERNANCE UPDATE

In 2022 RUSU was focused on returning as many of our events, programs and services back to campus in a safe and sustainable way, while also catering to the needs of students who were still studying from home or abroad or studying in hybrid mode. Returning vibrant student life to campus and maximising the student experience was our goal. We stretched ourselves (and our budgets) to our limits and exceeded our expectations across the board. 2022 was a massive success for RUSU!

2022 saw the highest level of SSAF funding for RUSU since the SSAF legislation was introduced and the highest level of activity and engagement at RUSU in many, many years. This 2022 Annual Report showcases our accomplishments and activities across all areas of RUSU and all campuses. From a governance, compliance and health and safety perspective, returning operations from being primarily delivered remotely or in hybrid mode to being delivered primarily in-person and on-campus was a significant challenge and an intensive process. RUSU management is grateful to our staff, elected student representatives and partners for all of their flexibility and dedication to making the shift, a safe and successful one!

KEY 2022 GOVERNANCE UPDATES

RUSU Incorporation Project

Having formally incorporated in late 2021, RUSU had a range of governance, compliance and administrative tasks to undertake in 2022 as part of this transition between the two structures. This included a significant overhaul of the RUSU Regulations www.rusu.rmit.edu.au/regulations and updates of internal policies and procedures.

RUSU held our first Annual General Meeting as an incorporated association. This was held in-person and on campus on May 12, 2022. 158 students attended (132 RUSU financial members (with AGM voting rights) and 26 RMIT students (non-voting).

RUSU Brand Refresh

In 2022 RUSU embarked on a refresh of our logo and branding, including updates to reflect our incorporated status. This was rolled out for the start of 2023.

RUSU Annual Elections

After two years of online only elections, elections were held in hybrid mode in 2022, with online voting (remotely or on-campus) and on-campus campaigning. Exactly 5000 students voted in the RUSU annual election which is the highest voter turn-out on record.

New Disabilities & Carers Officer and Department Launched

In 2021 RUSU successfully created an elected Disabilities & Carers Officer Bearer role and new RUSU department. In 2022 this department was launched. Congratulations to the Disabilities & Carers department for a very successful first year.

RUSU Student Union Council - By Students -For Students

RUSU is governed by a team of 28 annually elected student representatives, who form the RUSU Student Union Council (SUC). Induction and training was provided to the members of the SUC to ensure adequate financial literacy and an understanding of the legal responsibilities as members of the governing council.

The list of student representatives is included in the Financial Audit Report. Monthly Student Union Council Meetings were held in person and online. Records of attendance at SUC meetings is available on the RUSU website at:

Australian Charities and Not for Profit Commission (ACNC)

RUSU is registered as a not-for-profit organisation with the ACNC. RUSU is required to report to the ACNC annually. This provides another layer of external accountability for RUSU's operations.

RUSU and **RMIT** Deed Agreement

The bulk of RUSU funding is SSAF fees which are provided to RUSU through an Annual Funding Deed Agreement with RMIT. This Deed outlines governance and reporting requirements attached to the funding and RUSU's operations. RUSU complied with all of the requirement of the funding Deed in 2022.

External Affiliations

RUSU continued to be affiliated to the National Union of Students (NUS) and the Council of Postgraduate Associations (CAPA). These peak student groups played an important role lobbying and advocating for students interests during 2022.

RUSU FINANCIAL UPDATE

Your student fees at work @ RUSU

RMIT University charges students an annual Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) in accordance with the government SSAF legislation. This fee is collected by RMIT University to fund student services and amenities of a non-academic nature. Funding is distributed between a range of service areas and providers at the University, including RUSU.

In 2022 RUSU received a total of \$4,158,570 in SSAF fees through RMIT. This is the largest amount of SSAF Income RUSU has received since SSAF was introduced. In 2021 RUSU had an SSAF funding underspend of \$144,925, due to some events and programs not being able to be delivered due to Covid lock-downs and campus closures. It was mutually agreed with RMIT that RUSU would roll these funds into 2022, to spend on free food, events and RUSU club development. The total SSAF budgeted and spent by RUSU in 2022, including the funds rolled over from 2021, was \$4,303,495.

The 2022 grant from RMIT was received as a lump sum payment in late December 2021 for the 2022 year ahead. This upfront payment enabled RUSU to maximise opportunities to generate additional income through strategic investments. RUSU continued to engage Advisersure as investment advisors to assist with the management of our investments in accordance with the approved RUSU Financial Investment Strategy.

All RUSU SSAF funds were spent on the 19 areas permitted by the SSAF legislation (Allowable Items).

Base Grant (SSAF Funded)

The RUSU base grant covers all of our core operations and most RUSU staffing, student representative and administrative costs. Our base grant in 2022 was \$3,231,570. All of these base grant funds were spent in 2022 on SSAF allowable items.

Student Priority Grants (SSAF Funded)

In 2022 RUSU received, **\$927,000** in SSAF Committee 'Student Priority' grants, to provide a wide range of services and events run by students, for students. This included: free food and grocery vouchers, student events, Compass Welfare Services (outer campuses), Club grants, RUSU volunteer program, and specialist support for vocational education and postgraduate/ HDR students. A further **\$144,925** in SSAF was retained from unspent 2021 SSAF grants and used to fund RUSU Clubs development and campus events and free food.

In summary, in 2022 we received the following Student Priority Grants:

\$927,000 (Student Priority Grants) plus

\$144,925 (2021 carry over, Student Priority grants).

Total: \$1,071,925

In 2022 RUSU spent the full \$1,071,925 SSAF student priority grants.

RUSU Other Income

Additional sources of RUSU income include: investment income, 2022 RUSU financial memberships, Realfoods Cafe income and event ticket sales. Interest from investments in 2022 was **\$229,551.**

The financial audit for financial year 1 January to 31 December 2022 was conducted by independent auditors BDO and will be presented at the Annual General Meeting on 11 May 2023.

2022 Financial Position

In 2022 RUSU ran at an operating surplus (before income tax expenses) of \$95,678. However, after taking into account losses or investments, the total comprehensive income for RUSU for the financial year was a deficit of \$180,087.
